Dear Friends,

Since becoming Interim Moderator at the end of October there has been much going on. The Kirk Session has met on a number of occasions, the Church of Scotland's Presbytery Mission Plan has been agreed and there have been many meetings and conversations taking place behind the scenes at various levels. However, and most importantly, life in Morningside United has continued week by week.

Our 11am Sunday service is being led by a variety of people and is enriched by Brigitte's contributions on the organ, which is now back in action. Mary continues as pastoral assistant and I maintain links with Napier University. This is in addition to everything that goes on in the building and all that needs to be done to ensure Morningside United runs smoothly.

Being in ministerial vacancy is not easy but it is particularly challenging in the current climate. I am therefore grateful to everyone who has contributed and is contributing to Morningside United at this time, no matter how great or small, and especially at the special events that were held during Advent and Christmas.

As I was leading worship on 22 January I took the opportunity to reflect on where we are as a congregation. For many reasons there is much uncertainty about the future, with the only certainty really being change in some degree that goes beyond the current vacancy. The big question that we need to ponder is where is God calling Morningside United? The conversation we had after the service was warm, honest, and extremely useful as together we enter a period discernment to address this question.

The road ahead is complex as no matter what direction MUC takes it will have implications for us and others. However, it can also be exciting as we have resources and opportunities. There is much to consider over the coming weeks but something that is key, and should help with the decisions before us, is a vision and strategy for the future so that Morningside United can be the congregation God is calling it to be. This will require energy, passion, and commitment. As everything we do should flow from our worship on a Sunday, I therefore encourage you to make every effort to attend.

It is my intention to keep things moving. In February a meeting between representatives from Marchmont St Giles, St Catherine's Argyle and MUC is due to take place, I have arranged to meet with the minister of Marchmont St Giles, the Kirk Session meets on 27 February and our Synod Moderator, The Revd Paul Whittle, is in conversation with the Church of Scotland. I next lead worship on Sunday 12 March when I hope I can provide an update and we can have a second conversation as a congregation after the service.

Please do not hesitate to get in touch at any time if you have any questions, concerns or thoughts.

I opened our Kirk Session meeting on 23 January with this verse from Joshua 1:9. These are words spoken by God as Joshua is commissioned. I think they are useful and encouraging words for Morningside United to hear as we enter a process of discernment and consider the future.

I hereby command you: Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go.


Church Life at MUC – An Update
