

A message from Rev Sarah...

Dear friends,

It sometimes seems like January is the longest month. The weather is still cold, the nights continue to be dark, and never mind it's 31 days! It can feel like there are at least double or triple that!

Throughout the last month, our Sunday worship services have picked up on the epiphany theme of unwrapping. Starting with the unwrapping of the gifts that the magi presented to the infant Jesus and his parents, and moving through a gradual unwrapping of reflecting on who Jesus was, and is, both in his own time and for us today.

In 2024 Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, and St Valentine's Day coincide. Valentine's Day can provoke all sorts of different responses in people and is observed in different ways in various parts of the world. In the United States, for example, people might send Valentine's cards to family, friends, colleagues; certainly not only to someone who is, or is hoped to be, a partner or romantic interest. People though can struggle with this celebration of coupledom, for all sorts of reasons, with some holding a critical view of yet another day in the calendar that has been appropriated for commercial ends, and there's also the experience of diminishment that can occur for those who feel like they're missing out on something.

Valentine's Day is a date in the calendar, among others, that is about relationships. Whether we warm more to the American concept of celebrating a wide range of relationships, prefer the British version of a romantic Valentine's Day, would like to ignore the entire concept altogether, or something else, relationships are central to all our lives.

As we move into Lent our Sunday theme will reflect on social justice. This is something that is front and centre in the work of many churches, faith communities, and among all, people of goodwill as we seek and strive to make the world a better place. As Christians we are a people who are called to change the world. We understand that the

furtherance of justice in all spheres of life is a central part of this aspiration.

The authors of the Spill the Beans resource that inspires much of our worship this year connect St Valentine, Lent and Social Justice thus:

"Implicit in seeking social justice is an understanding of the interrelatedness of creation and people on this planet. We are bound together and seeking to live well and in harmony with creation means recognising the relationships around us, nurturing them and encouraging them."

Through Lent, in worship, we reflect on the interrelatedness of humanity and of humanity with the created world around us. We inhabit a world where many people do not have enough; where habitats are under threat; where justice is not always done or seen to be done.

Also, through Lent here at Morningside United Church, I invite everyone connected with our church to reflect on our relationships with one another. There are many rich friendships between people connected with our church and a web of family networks within our fellowship too. The footfall of people who come into our buildings for various activities must run to the hundreds, if not more.

We are called together as fellow disciples and pilgrims on our life's journeys. Each of us has a distinctive story that has brought us to our current stage in life. All of us have a part to play in our fellowship; be that small or large, hidden or public.

As I learn more about MUC and the folk who make us who we are, I am aiming through Lent to visit, or meet, with as many people who are on our church rolls as I can. I am happy to meet with people individually, or as couples and families. I can come to people's homes, or meet in mutually convenient cafes, other public spaces, or at church. I am flexible about days of the week and times of day. Sometimes an elder may join in with these conversations too. The purpose of these conversations is to help me get to know everyone better and to learn

what individuals' hopes and dreams are for MUC in the present and future.

We are always in need of more folk to be more involved in the life of MUC, so conversations might include discussion about ways to support our work. Who might make a good elder or office bearer? Who has particular interests or passions that might enhance our work and witness in our parish? What do we need to stop doing, both individually and as a community, so we can start doing something else that energises and interests us?

I recognize that many people are incredibly busy, but would ask for the opportunity to meet, converse and discuss. One of the most awkward things that sometimes gets said to ministers and others embarking on these sorts of projects goes something like, 'you're so busy, there must be more deserving people than me for your time'. Please be rest assured that this is a chance for everyone to be offered time to catch up. Everyone has views that need to be heard. Of course, if anyone doesn't want a conversation for whatever reason that's fine, but I really hope that this is something that will be a pleasure for everyone and not an inconvenience or something to be nervous about.

I look forward to meeting folk over Lent, and hope to strengthen and deepen relationships between MUC, our community and parish.


URC Leading your Church into Growth, Preston

Amen




A good book to read "Where memories go" by Sally Magnusson

2023 Charity Update -

The donations we made in 2023 to outside charities were £1,907 to the Salvation Army Gorgie Foodbank (£945 of this was from the 2022 advent collection which is usually paid out at the start of the next year). £962 was from coffee mornings during 2023 at request of people at the coffee mornings. Our harvest collection of non-perishable food also went there. The 2023 Lent collection of £445 went to Christian Aid. From the 2023 advent collection £1,170 has now been sent to Fresh Start for their 'Cookers for Christmas' appeal. Edinburgh-based Fresh Start help people who have been homeless get established in new homes.

Eric Liddell 100

Eric Liddell is best-known for his athletic achievements, particularly his gold medal in the 400 metres at the Paris Olympics in 1924. In association with the Eric Liddell Community's celebration of the centenary of that victory, this event will focus on the other aspect of his life, which was perhaps even more important to him, namely his life and work as a Christian missionary and teacher in China.

In this half-day programme, three scholars of the University of Edinburgh will focus on Liddell's life and work in China, his legacy there, and the subsequent history of Chinese Christianity, worldwide and in China itself.

On Saturday 3 February, 10am-12.30pm, there will be a talk held at The Playfair Library, Old College, University of Edinburgh, South Bridge with contributions from Prof Brian Stanley, Dr Alexander Chow & Dr Mark McLeister.


