Camouflage Nets update

and cookies.



Camouflage nets are used for green corridors: to exchange people released from captivity, let civilians leave dangerous areas, to hide hospitals, cars and equipment from the enemy, and to prevent their drones targeting them.

The nets are really useful in Ukraine but they also look like pieces of art similar to tapestries.

In our September issue of Link magazine, we had an appeal for fabric to help make camouflage nets to send to Ukraine. Over the past six months or so, people have been coming together to make the nets. Already, 18 nets (5m x 6m) have been made. To explain the amount of work that goes into making each one, we have asked Hanna who helped set up this group.

It can take anything between 4-8 hours to make a camouflage net (each 5m x 6m: 30 sq m). But before that we need some cloth, if required we dye the

Every Friday and Saturday, from 4-8 pm, about 14-25 people come to work on the netting in one of the upstairs rooms.

This kind of volunteering is like art therapy. People talk and laugh whilst netting. There is a genuine feeling of community with folk from all around both Ukraine and the UK, of different ages and background. Elizabeth, one of our local volunteers, often bakes delicious flapjacks and cookies for us to enjoy during our breaks. Sometimes relocated Ukrainians in the UK might feel guilty because they think they are not helping Ukraine enough, so netting helps them to make their contribution in assisting their country.

There are many benefits to the work that is being done: there is the eco side of it, in that we use old clothes and bedding to make the nets. But there is also the community aspect, which is so important. People can network and help each other, whether it's to find accommodation, work, or just to be there for one another.

Netting is about creativity and reaching one's potential, as volunteers have to be imaginative to make the proper nets. Some people have also learnt how to make beautiful bracelets to send to Ukraine.

Whilst we are making nets, we sing Ukrainian and Scottish songs together and it unites us as a community. It also helps us learn about each other's cultures and traditions.

We also collect a Food bank and Clothes bank for those in need and we send some items to Ukraine.



Our society also collaborates with some churches and charities, e.g., Morningside United Church where we are doing the netting now, Sunflower Scotland Charity, Ukrainian Catholic Church and Father Vasyl Kren, St Cuthberts Church, the Scottish Baby Box Appeal Charity and Martin Pearce, Scottish Army cadets, AUGB Ukrainian Community Club and others. So, making nets is meaningful and purposeful for Ukrainians and other nationalities who support Ukraine. They connect for the sake of one common goal. Volunteers are kind to each other; they support and help Ukraine and their friends as much as they can. People come to do the netting again and again, enjoying their time together in a friendly and encouraging atmosphere. Netting also helps Ukrainian relocated people integrate into the British society quicker.

We hope our society can unite more relocated Ukrainians in Scotland, British people and all the other nationalities who are living here. If you would like to get involved, please come along, you would be so welcome, or if you have materials that you can pass along, that would also be appreciated. You can find out more about our group from the links below. We promote camouflage netting in some rather big Telegram groups where there are from 100 to 3400 Ukrainians and other nationalities living in Scotland. They come to help netting from different places in Scotland. Moreover, we also have Facebook and Instagram pages and often ask Sunflower Sisters charity organization to promote our group on their page in Facebook and it helps a lot.

Church Life at MUC – An Update


