

A message from Rev Sarah...

Dear friends,

Most readers of the Link will be aware that while I work three days a week (or so!) focusing on transitional ministry at Morningside United, the remaining time within my ministry (two days, or so) continues to offer similar skills to other congregations within the United Reformed Church National Synod of Scotland. Sometimes I am asked to summarise what I do and do so by describing this ministry as working alongside congregations, and the people who lead them, to discern and develop visions and strategies for mission and ministry for the short and medium term future. As the world changes so quickly, and particularly so since the coronavirus pandemic, I find myself feeling nervous about planning too much for the long term in almost any aspect of life.

My involvement in other places includes shorter- and longer-term pieces of work, leading the new synod mission committee, and representing the National Synod of Scotland in some wider fora. Most notably this includes the whole URC Mission Enablers Network as well as some other ad-hoc groups. A few weeks ago, I had an opportunity to attend an ecumenical Fresh Expressions gathering. Participants attended the event in denominational teams, with teams present from the Churches of England and Scotland, the Methodist Church, and the Salvation Army, as well as the United Reformed Church.

As the basis for reflection at the event we were invited to ponder three questions: What Is? What Could Be? What Will Be? in respect of the communities we each work. Or in other words, firstly what are the realities of place, people, and overall situation at the present time? Secondly, given everything that could impact positively happening, happens, what might the future look like?

This is an opportunity to dream a little or a lot, to consider outcome if every possible risk paid off and worked out to the best, if everyone who needs to get behind a project to make it work does their thing. Lastly, what will happen? This could be what will be the future if nothing changes, and a community or situation continues exactly as they are at present, or a community simply does whatever it normally does. Or this could be answered to mean something changes in between doing nothing and everything possible happening so some middle outcome emerges.

Here's an example of this using my garden as the focus.

What Is?

At present at the end of the winter, my garden is a bit of a mess. I haven't cleared away the detritus from last year. Some areas are overgrown. I did plant garlic before Christmas in one area. I have bought seed potatoes and tomato seeds ready to plant in the spring.

What Could Be?

Everything could be cleared out of beds, borders and greenhouse. I could plant what I have, buy some new shrubs and plant those, keep on top of the work through the growing season and have a stunning garden.

What Will Be?

A bit of tidying up will happen. The greenhouse will get sorted out and some of the beds and borders cleared. Tomatoes and potatoes will be planted, and some other plants bought from the garden centre. The garden will be acceptable through the better months and there will be some homegrown vegetables to eat.

In this example the What Will Be outcome is not a bad one. It is what realistically is likely to happen given other constraints e.g. my time, the weather etc. But I am challenged to wonder what I could do better or at least differently.

It's worth our pondering these questions here at MUC. What Is? What Could Be? What Will Be?

What might we be called to do that will shift us closer towards what could be the future for our church rather than what will be? Of course, I have assumed a 'could' outcome in positive terms; a could be might be the worst or least desired future with the 'will' outcome something more attractive than that. I invite you to ponder these questions in relation to MUC (and to whatever other area of life you wish!) over the coming weeks. I'd be interested to hear what you think in due course!

Meanwhile as we continue through Lent our Sunday themes follow a social justice theme as suggested through the Word in the World Resource prepared by our colleagues who write that material. We journey with Jesus towards Jerusalem with these themes reflecting on how our faith and discipleship informs and deepens our own life experience.

Recently some of us went to a very interesting event entitled "The Life and Death of Eric Liddell and the Rebirth of Chinese Christianity" in the Playfair library, Edinburgh University. It was sponsored by Edinburgh University, Eric Liddell 100, Christ Church and Morningside United Church.

Message from Professor Hugh Goddard (Christ Church) who was the organiser and chaired the event.

"Thank you for coming along to the recent event on "The Life and Death of Eric Liddell and the Rebirth of Chinese Christianity" and I hope you enjoyed the opportunity to reflect together on Liddell's own involvement in China, and on the subsequent history of Chinese Christianity, both in China and here in Scotland. Other resources on Eric Liddell's life and achievements are available on that site, including the Massive Open-Access Online Course -Online Learning -The Eric Liddell Community. This is now matched by a parallel resource which is intended for use particularly in schools, to introduce Eric Liddell to a younger generation who may not necessarily be familiar with "Chariots of Fire" - Education Resource -The Eric Liddell Community.

Looking ahead plans are being made for an interfaith celebration of Eric Liddell's legacy at St. Giles Cathedral on Saturday 22 June. 
Eric Liddell 100 continues to be marked in different ways in Morningside United Church.

"Faith in Scotland's Constitutional Future"

This is a project of the School of Critical Studies / Theology & Religious Studies at the University of Glasgow, led by Professor Heather Walton and the Rev Dr Doug Gay. This is an ecumenical, non-partisan and politically/constitutionally neutral research project exploring how folk in churches relate faith to constitutional questions in Scotland.

As part of this project, twelve regional events for church members/adherents are taking place around Scotland. After video presentations from four Christians prominent in Scottish politics (two pro-Union and two pro-Independence) the discussion will involve listening respectfully to one another's positions and arguments. This will aim towards relating this difficult and emotive topic to the common Christian faith of participants.

There will be an event at Morningside United Church, Edinburgh, on Monday 18 March starting at 7 pm. Admission is free. I am very grateful to the Rev Sarah Moore and the congregation of Morningside United Church for helping to facilitate this. Members of your congregation are very welcome to come.
