# Dear Friends,

What are you doing here?

It is a question God asks Elijah twice as he hides in a cave. The prophet is not in a good way after the events on Mount Carmel. He may have been successful in demonstrating that Yahweh was the one and only supreme God of all, but his subsequent actions resulting in the killing of the prophets of Baal has not gone well with Queen Jezebel, who is after him.

Elijah is on the run. After forty days and nights in the wilderness he arrives at Mount Horeb and finds refuge in a cave as God ask him:

"What are you doing here?"

It is a simple question yet how it is asked and the tone that is used to ask it, can have a significant impact on how it is received, and therefore the kind of response it gets. I wonder how God asked it. Was it asked with anger, empathy, surprise, or disappointment? And was it the same both times it was asked?

We don't know, but in response Elijah gives the same three reason defence. What he fails to say in this though, is that he has come to seek Gods help and protection.

As Elijah hides in the cave and the night progresses a great wind forms, then an earthquake is felt, which is followed by a fire. But God was in none of them. It is only after they pass and there was the sound of 'sheer silence' (NRSV) that Elijah encounters the presence of God.

The New International Version and New Living Translation describes this silence as a gentle whisper. The King James Bible describes it as a still small voice. The New English Bible refers to a faint murmuring. The Good News Translation mentions the soft whisper of a voice. And the Message refers to a gentle and quiet whisper.

It was that silence, that whisper, that murmuring, that still small voice of calm, that drew Elijah out of the cave.

In recognising the need for silence to experience an encounter with God Mother Teresa said:

"We need silence to be alone with God, to speak to him, to ponder his words deep in our hearts. We need to be alone with God in silence to be rescued and transformed. Silence gives us a new outlook on life. In it we are filled with the energy of God himself that makes us do all things with joy".

## What are you doing here?

Is it a fair question that we might have been asked in various ways and situations, or even asked of ourselves, especially when things have not turned out as we had hoped or expected; be that positive or negative. I wonder how you would respond if this question was put to you on a Sunday morning at Morningside United?

Perhaps it is a question you have asked yourself? Perhaps it is a question family and friends have asked? Perhaps it is a question our neighbours, and the people who walk past the door and stand at the crossing on Holy Corner on a Sunday, wonder as they watch you enter the building? And I wonder how it should be asked?

## What are you doing here?

With all the challenges we face, and the routines in life as well as everything that can compete for attention and priority, it can be easy to forget the value of our time in worship at 11am on a Sunday.

A precious time to step back from the chaos and noise outside to simply be.

A time to consciously still our minds, breathe and find silence; as we listen for that still small voice of calm and seek an encounter with God.

Could this be what we should be telling those who might be asking us the question - what are you doing here?

Let's be honest though, it can take effort and other things can often win our attention and priority on a Sunday morning; but in being in the place of calm that Morningside United offers every week, help and healing can be found if you take time to listen for that same silence, that whisper, that still small voice of calm that drew Elijah out of the cave in the despair he was experiencing.

What are you doing here?

Breathe through the heats of our desire thy coolness and thy balm; let sense be dumb, let flesh retire; speak through the earthquake, wind and fire, O still small voice of calm! O still small voice of calm!

# Ministry and Mission Fund – Annual letter to Local Churches

To: All members and adherents of United Reformed Churches and our Local Ecumenical Partnerships

Dear Friends,

When will normal service be resumed?

As we are writing this letter and closing off the URC's accounts for 2022, the country is still torn with industrial disputes, mostly notably with Health Service workers, rail industry workers, teachers etc. etc. Whatever your view as to the wisdom or justice of such action, we suspect all of us are affected by the disruption to some degree.

In church life too, are we back to "normal life"? Some churches no doubt have returned to something like their pre-Covid level of activity and attendance numbers. Quite a few have recommenced their activity but find their numbers have reduced. Some churches have found re-opening too difficult and have decided to close.

Whatever the "new normal" was to be, we suggest its arrival has (like many trains) been disrupted, delayed, or cancelled all together.

The URC's finance officers had concerns that the late arrival of the return to normality would impact very significantly on the giving to the M&M Fund in 2022. However, the churches responded magnificently and the giving to M&M was £600,000 ahead of budget. It was also only 2.5% down on 2021's result.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2022 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could. With normal service not yet resumed, 2023 is not going to be an easy year either. We now have the added disruption of high inflation, pushing up wages and overhead costs. As the Spirit directs and as our

means allow, can the churches once more respond to the call of our gracious, loving and ever-generous God?

Again, thank you all!
